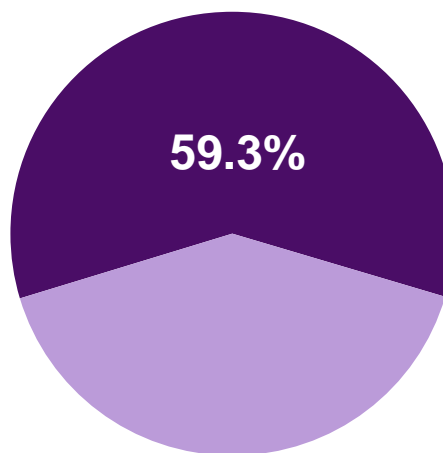
DATA FROM THE 2015 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM

In North Dakota, **9.9 percent** of those aged 45 and over report they are experiencing confusion or memory loss that is happening more often or is getting worse (“subjective cognitive decline”).

Nearly **60 percent** of them have not talked to a health care professional about it.

For those with worsening memory problems, **46.7 percent** say it has created “functional difficulties” – that is, caused them to give up day-to-day activities and/or interfered with work or social activities.

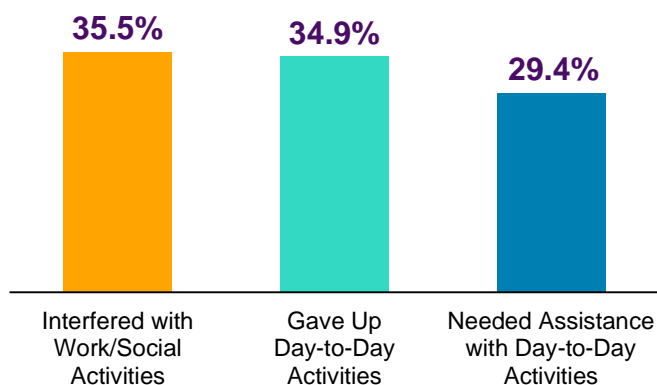
Percent with memory problems who have not talked to a health care provider



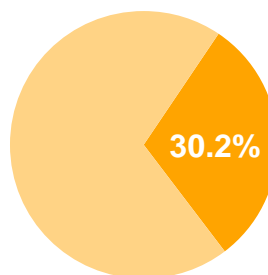

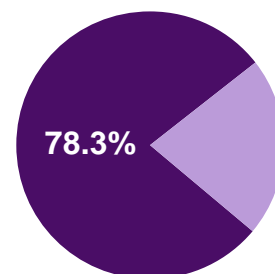
Percent with memory problems who say it created difficulties and burden
