


DATA FROM THE 2011 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM

In Utah, 17 percent of those aged 60 and over – and one in three aged 85 and over – report that they are experiencing confusion or memory loss that is happening more often or is getting worse.


Over 80 percent of them have <u>not</u> talked to a health care professional about it.

For those with worsening memory problems, about one in three says it has interfered with household activities and/or work or social activities. Percent with memory problems who have <u>not</u> talked to a health care provider




