


DATA FROM THE 2013 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM


In Alaska, 11 percent – one in nine – of those aged 45 and over report they are experiencing confusion or memory loss that is happening more often or is getting worse.

More than 70 percent of them have <u>not</u> talked to a health care professional about it.


For those with worsening memory problems, nearly four in ten say it has interfered with household activities and/or work or social activities. Percent with memory problems who have <u>not</u> talked to a health care provider




