


DATA FROM THE 2011 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM

In Maryland, 9.5 percent of those aged 60 and over report that they are experiencing confusion or memory loss that is happening more often or is getting worse.

Over 85 percent of them have <u>not</u> talked to a health care professional about it.

For those with worsening memory problems, one in four says it has interfered with household activities and/or work or social activities. Percent with memory problems who have not talked to a health care provider




