



DATA FROM THE 2011 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM

In Oklahoma, 12.1 percent – almost one in eight – of those aged 60 and over report that they are experiencing confusion or memory loss that is happening more often or is getting worse.

Over 75 percent of them have <u>not</u> talked to a health care professional about it.


For those with worsening memory problems, about one in three says it has interfered with household activities and/or work or social activities. Percent with memory problems who have not talked to a health care provider



Percent of Those Aged 60+ Reporting Worsening Memory Problems in Previous 12 Months All Gender Age Disability Veterans


