

DATA FROM THE 2014 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM

In Pennsylvania, 10.2 percent – more than one in ten – of those aged 60 and over report they are experiencing confusion or memory loss that is happening more often or is getting worse.

Nearly 75 percent of them have <u>not</u> talked to a health care professional about it.


For those with worsening memory problems, nearly 40 percent say it has interfered with household activities and/or work or social activities.
