


DATA FROM THE 2013 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM


In Vermont, 10.4 percent of those aged 45 and over report they are experiencing confusion or memory loss that is happening more often or is getting worse.

Nearly three-quarters of them have <u>not</u> talked to a health care professional about it.


For those with worsening memory problems, more than one-third say it has interfered with household activities and/or work or social activities. Percent with memory problems who have not talked to a health care provider


