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
Greater Illinois Chapter

The close of fiscal year 2014 was also the end of our three-year strategic plan. During those three years our work focused around five strategic objectives identified by the Alzheimer's Association nationally.

The objectives were:

- Increasing concern and awareness
- Advancing public policy
- Enhancing care and support
- Accelerating research
- Growing revenue to meet mission goals

These objectives drove the Greater Illinois Chapter in our efforts to fight Alzheimer's and offer help and hope to all those affected by this devastating disease.



Increasing Concern and Awareness

We need to engage more people in our cause. Our three year strategic plan included a continued commitment to strengthen the momentum of the Alzheimer's disease movement by increasing concern about Alzheimer's disease and increasing constituent engagement through activities to support all strategic objectives.

Goals for this objective were to increase media impressions and grow community presence and the Alzheimer's movement by doubling the number of Walk participants and expanding to additional geographies.

The chapter saw 100 percent average yearly growth in media impressions over three years. Two Walks were added, and overall Walk to End Alzheimer's® participants increased by 57.3 percent over the three years of the strategic plan.



Advancing Public Policy

The hard work and dedication of our volunteer advocates in Illinois helped to steadily increase the Association's influence with policymakers to achieve effective implementation of the National Alzheimer's Plan and established federal and state policy priorities. We executed strategies to develop knowledgeable, professional, and productive relationships with state policymakers; mobilizing Alzheimer's advocates in a comprehensive, coordinated and activist-oriented plan to engage members of Congress.

We now have approximately 900 advocates per district, ending FY14 with 25,521 total advocates in the Greater Illinois Chapter territory and one ambassador for every member of the U.S. House and Senate. During the past year these dedicated individuals made 99 total visits to the United States House and Senate.

Other notable accomplishments include:

- Collaborated with the Illinois
 Department of Public Health and state legislators to offer continuing education credits to first responders participating in online training.
- Engaged Ambassadors to work with their federal legislators to obtain \$122 million in additional federal funding for research, care and support.
- Recruited over 35 advocates (double the number from the prior year) to attend the Washington, D.C. National Forum, making visits to every one of the 20 members of the Illinois delegation on Capitol Hill.
- Increased the number of attendees for our annual Illinois lobby day, resulting in more than 100 participants throughout the state.
- Engaged hundreds of supporters to reserve Alzheimer's awareness license plates, with proceeds to benefit care, support, education and awareness programs throughout Illinois.



Enhancing Care and Support

Those affected by Alzheimer's disease or another dementia turn to the Alzheimer's Association for help and information. During the past year, the Alzheimer's Association, Greater Illinois Chapter served:

- 13,288 people who attended our educational programs
- 4,526 attendees at our support groups

- 8,799 callers to our 24/7 Helpline
- 141 people through our Care Navigation services
- 3,721 enrollees in our MedicAlert®+Safe Return®program
- 152,651 visitors to our website

Accelerating Research

The Alzheimer's Association continues to be the respected leader and largest non-profit funder in advancing international Alzheimer's research. The Greater Illinois Chapter is fortunate to have a number of the best Alzheimer's research facilities within its territory. We will be doing much more to coordinate locally with that talented and dedicated research



community while we work to educate our constituents about the latest advances.

During FY14, one objective was to increase participation in Alzheimer's disease research and science priorities by engaging individuals and institutions in the global research effort.

Results:

- 247 attendees from our Chapter area to the Alzheimer's Association International Conferences (AAIC)[®]
- 154 ISTAART® members in the chapter area. The Alzheimer's Association International Society to Advance Alzheimer's Research and Treatment (ISTAART) is a professional society for individuals interested in Alzheimer's and dementia science including scientists, physicians and other professionals involved in the causes and treatments of Alzheimer's disease and other dementias.
- 4,854 TrialMatch® profiles started during three years of plan. In fact, the Greater Illinois Chapter lead the nation in number of TrialMatch registrations for three consecutive years. Funding and lack of participants in clinical trials are the biggest hindrance in research efforts.

Growing Revenue Support of the Mission

With your help, we had a strong fundraising year, enabling us to expand our support for families and simultaneously increase our investments in research. Thousands of you supported our efforts and the Walk to End Alzheimer's, hundreds joined our ALZ Stars® team to support the cause at events like the Chicago Marathon and thousands of others gave generously of their time and treasure.



During the 2014 fiscal year:

- More than \$1.9 million was raised at 17 Walks to End Alzheimer's throughout Illinois
- 11,288 people participated in the Walk To End Alzheimer's
- The Reason to Hope luncheons grew 32 percent, bringing in \$208,752
- Participation in the ALZ Stars athletic endurance program increased 21.2 percent
- Third-party revenue brought in \$270,771.






FY14 Revenue
